Introduction

The Department of Post-Secondary Education, Training and Labour (Saint John), Anglophone South School District and the Work Room Career Resource Centres have developed a program to assist people in preparing their career plan. PACE (Plan to Achieve Career Excellence) is divided into 5 sequential modules that combine to create an effective career plan. This workbook supports the second module-"Researching Careers" by providing additional information, resources and activities to help people to conduct thorough career research and match their interests with potential career opportunities..

The Province of New Brunswick has purchased this online career planning tool for students in New Brunswick High Schools and the public to use free of charge. Users can search a database of occupations to discover information on a variety of different careers. If they can't decide on a career, they can access interest inventories that suggest possible career options based on their interests. This career planning tool is very easy to use and provides a wealth of information. What's more, the information can be accessed 24 hours a day from any computer! The Work Room. There are eight career resource centres located in southwestern NB. - Not all occupations (or action plans) are possible, so participants will be encouraged to narrow down their prospective career options to a few manageable alternatives that they can implement effectively.
